# Celebrating 30 Years of God's Goodness, Grace & Glory



On the evening of 13th July, students and staff of Methodist College Kuala Lumpur, both past and present, along with friends, relatives and corporate associates made their way to the Hilton Kuala Lumpur Hotel in KL Sentral to celebrate MCKL's 30th Anniversary. It was an event of great significance: a milestone to mark the progress of the college through thick and thin in its efforts to play its part in preparing our youth for the future. The grand ballroom was filled with the energetic and vibrant atmosphere of over 580 guests as students and staff were reunited, some after many years of divergent paths in life. In addition to that, the ceremony served as an opportunity to award long-serving staff for their dedication and perseverance, as well as to launch the MCKL Alumni Association.

The event was made memorable by a speech from the CEO of the College, Ms Moey Yoke Lai, followed by speeches from the Chairman of the Board, Dato' Dr Tan Kee Kwong, and guest of honour Bishop Dr Ong Hwai Teik. The spirit of their messages was basically to thank God for his many blessings upon the College and to encourage and thank all who had given their time, resources and enthusiasm in serving MCKL and helping it to become the College of Excellence for Life.

It began thirty years ago, when the College was simply a school intended to serve as an institution of second chances for students who were unsuccessful in passing their public school examinations. When they otherwise would have faced a bleak future, the then Methodist High School enabled them to complete their secondary education.

Throughout the years, various Methodist patrons have played a pivotal role in ensuring the College's survival and growth in an ever-changing education landscape. In 1983, Methodist High School changed its name to Methodist College Kuala Lumpur, and Datuk Bhupalan became its founding Principal. She undertook the task of securing approval for the GCE A Level certificate to go alongside the Malaysian STPM. Under her dynamic leadership, the student population grew

1893-2013. We celebrate thirty years of providing quality education for youth in our country. Year by year we send our students to the best universities and they have made us very proud of them because of the prestigious scholarships that they have to celebrate our thirtieth anniversary.

MCKL has grown by leaps and bounds. Student enrolment exceeded 1000 this January. Staff numbered 112, both academic and non-academic. There are at least 30 clubs and societies actively engaging the students in happy pursuits. All these keep the College busy the whole year round. Our achievements and activities are recorded in the Vision magazine which reached such a high standard last year. We said farewell to Miss Leow Lee Lin, Director of Academic Studies at the end of December 2012. She gave of herself freely in her service and helped the College reach a higher plane. In March 2013, Dr Ang Aik Hooi was appointed Director and he has helped us with the preparation for the American Degree Transfer Programme which we hope will be launched in April 2014. He has also put in place a number of procedures to ensure that our academic standards remain high.

Dr Tan Hui Leng joined us in June as Director of Teaching and Learning. She has introduced a richer culture of pedagogical training for our lecturers. In April we had to make a very big decision to migrate to the Cambridge A Levels. It was a most challenging time for the whole College. Eighty per cent of our January and March intakes of students decided to stay with the College in this move. I should like to record my heartfelt appreciation for the staff and students who have worked very diligently to prepare themselves for the AS examinations this October. Dedicated staff are becoming a rare breed, but I must say that we have many of this breed in MCKL!

In July this year we had a grand dinner What a celebration it was! My thanks go to Mr Reuben Chan and his marketing team for the successful organization. Our hearts were all warmed by the many video clips sent by our alumni from all over the world with their warmest greetings and kind words. They will be the future leaders of our country. To think that we had a hand in moulding them to become what they will be in the future gives us great joy.

This year saw a number of our students participating in inter-college sports. The MCKL team of 28 students who participated in the Standard Chartered Kuala Lumpur Marathon emerged first runner-up among 14 universities and colleges. For the inter-varsity ECE games, the MCKL team emerged as second runner-up. Congratulations to our students!

In the academics, MCKL students won 19 High Achiever Awards from Edexcel in the June examinations this year. Their names are printed elsewhere in this newsletter.

All these good successes have kept us on a high crest. It is Almighty God who has guided us and led us all the way. It is to Him that we attribute our praise for the blessings He has poured upon the College. As the ancient prophet Micah has said, "He has shown you, O mortal, what is good. And what does the LORD require of you? To act justly and to love mercy and to walk humbly with your God." We trust that all our students will live out these words wherever they go.

What are the challenges ahead for the College? Our students in the Certified Accounting Technician programme will rejoice that they can stay on in the College in their pursuit of an accounting qualification because we shall begin to offer the ACCA programme in January 2014. This new programme will pose many challenges to us. However, we are confident that God has led us in this decision and that He will give us an opportunity to train students to become accountants of integrity.

Furthermore, we await the approval from the Ministry of Education to run the American Degree Transfer Programme. If everything goes according to plan we hope to launch this in April 2014. To God be the glory for all the great things He has done for the College and for individuals who have come under our wings.

tremendously for the next ten years, to the point where the classes for Form 1 had to be shifted the new branch campus in Sentul, Kuala

In 1994, after having firmly established Methodist College Kuala Lumpur and its Sentul campus, Datuk F. R. Bhupalan retired and handed the reins over to Mr A. R. Peter, who led the College through a new phase as an institution for post-secondary education. He continued the migration of secondary school students to the Sentul campus, and by 1999, only pre-university students remained in the Brickfields campus. The College grew relatively quiet as a result of this.

Soon after that in August 2003, Mr A. R. Peter passed the torch to Datuk Dr Chiam Heng Keng, who began developing the ethos of MCKL into one of a tertiary institution. Staff and students were introduced to practices that were typical of colleges, such as removing the need for uniforms and introducing flexible timetables for students. At the same time, she ensured that ethics, integrity and discipline were not compromised in the effort to give MCKL a more college-like atmosphere, and continued to keep it well grounded in Christian values. She also introduced the Certificate in English programme and the Diploma in Early Childhood Education. However, these developments did little to reverse the decline of student numbers in the College.

MCKL persevered regardless, and in March 2006, Ms Moey Yoke Lai, former Principal of Methodist Boys' School, took over as CEO of the College. She worked tirelessly to bring in more students for the courses offered. Plans were drawn up for expansion of the College, which would include an auditorium, many new classrooms and several new facilities in order to

attract more students.

Although the project seemed beyond the means of MCKL at the time, Ms Moey and the Methodist Council of Education soldiered on, trusting in the Lord to provide the resources necessary to see the project through to the end. Construction began at the end of 2008, and by the time it was completed, more than half of the required funds had been successfully raised. Student numbers began to climb, and by 2012, there were over a thousand students enrolled in MCKL. It is nothing short of a testament to God's providence when we trust in Him, and we are reminded of this by Isaiah 54: 2, "Enlarge the place of your tent, spread your curtains wide, do not hold back; lengthen your cords, strengthen your stakes."

Ms Moey continues to serve faithfully even to this day, and there are many who are following her example. Amongst them is Ms Khor Kheng Leik, the Deputy Director of Academic Studies and Head of the Diploma in Early

Childhood Education programme, who is a Harvard graduate with a Master's in Education. Alongside her are academicians such as Mr Tee Shern Ren, Ms Grace Lim and Dr Lee Chong Yew, who are graduates from Australian National University, University of Cambridge and University of Southampton, respectively. There are many others like them, and some go the extra mile by serving as mentors or advisors for individual students as well as the various clubs and societies, including the Christian Fellowship. It is because of the continuous efforts and vigilance of such staff members that MCKL is able to focus on holistic education, ensuring that its students' academic excellence is complemented by empathy, moral integrity and a strong passion for making a significant difference to their families, society and nation. As Ms Moey puts it, "Let us all work together to make MCKL a College of distinction to produce well educated citizens who will make us proud of their achievements in nation building."

To further facilitate their efforts, the College encourages students to participate in a wide range of co-curricular and sporting activities. There are over 40 clubs and societies that students can choose from, such as the Model United Nations Club, Economics Club, Leo Club or the Music Club. Community Service is also an integral part of a student's experience in MCKL. Their participation in the various activities will help develop interest in different cultures, build confidence, time management, leadership and interpersonal skills, and mature in self-control and discipline. MCKL's Christian Fellowship is one of the most comprehensive in these aspects, as it also allows students to grow in their faith and relationship with God in addition to having fellowship with others from all walks of life, regardless of race or creed. For example, the Interfaith Dialogue which is organised annually by the Christian Fellowship is an excellent platform for

















students to grow in mutual understanding and interracial harmony.

As a result of the collective efforts of the committed staff, MCKL has been able to assist students in achieving their full potential, graduating with excellent grades and gaining entry into prestigious universities around the world. In 2011, Chew Kwang Liang was the only Malaysian student accepted into Yale University. Last year, Tong Kin Seng was the only Malaysian student who gained entry to read Medicine at the University of Oxford. And this year has a line-up of students with impressive admissions and scholarships: Chan Yen Ping will enter Cambridge University on the MCKL Teaching Scholarship; Janice Koh Kar Oon will enter the University of Tokyo on the JAGAM & Japanese Government Scholarships; Joshua Wong gained entry into Nanyang Technological University on the ASEAN Scholarship; Ng Wai Lam and Lok Chen-Yue have both received the Khazanah Scholarship to study Biochemistry in the University of Oxford and Economics in University College London respectively; and How Han Ming is the only Malaysian to receive the prestigious Wesleyan Freeman Scholarship.

This is in stark contrast to what MCKL was thirty years ago. Over that period, the School of Second Chance has grown into a College of Excellence for Life where thousands of students have been touched and changed for the better, thanks to God's grace and glory. The thirty-year journey was not always rosy, as there were many trials and tribulations along the way. However, by God's grace MCKL has weathered and overcome all of these challenges, and thus has over thirty years of experience in maintaining its academic integrity whilst holding true to its Methodist roots.

According to Bishop Rev. Dr Ong Hwai Teik, "The Lord has been our good Shepherd in taking the College through the desert and into the pastures of today," and nothing speaks of that more than the success of MCKL alumni and our growing student enrolment. There even are plans to further expand the college in order to accommodate further growth in the near future. The College has come a long way from its humble beginnings, and it is our hope that God will continue to shower His blessings upon MCKL so that we may continue to serve in nurturing a community where excellence in all forms is celebrated, and where individuals come alive to their God-given ability to make a unique difference in the world.

# Chan Yen Ping, A Level Class of 2013




Yen Ping is one of the two inaugural MCKL Teaching Scholarship recipients and is currently pursuing a degree in Education at University of Cambridge.

I hail from Kepong, KL, a place previously associated with stereotypes ranging from Chinese gangsters to poor fashion sense. Sometimes the more educated families in my area prefer to commute further daily or even shift their houses to grant their children better education. However, my parents taught me this: where God is with you, you are in the best place you can be in. Hence, my primary and secondary school education were completed in SJK(C) Kepong 2 and SMK Taman Bukit Maluri respectively - lesser-known schools, but still decent in their own right.

Completing my GCE'A' Levels in Methodist College Kuala Lumpur was a slightly different scenario. I had never studied amongst so many Christians in my life. While we have normal lessons, it is not surprising to have theological discussions in the canteen, and it is quite easy to find someone to pray for you when in need.

Above all, I learned wisdom over knowledge – not to separate between secular and sacred, for all things are created by God.

There came a time in college when university applications were at the back of everyone's mind. I remember attending a talk from a visiting Hong Kong university and coming home feeling intimidated. I wrote in my journal:



After which, I opened my Bible, and God immediately replied:

If you have raced with men on foot and they have worn you out, how can you compete with horses?

If you stumble in safe country, how will you manage in the thickets by the Jordan?

(Jeremiah 12:5)

"Eeesh, God...fine, I'll go study harder."

One day, Ms Choong, my university placement counsellor called me in and encouraged me to apply to Oxbridge (She doesn't just give university advice, she also offers additional services such as praying



for you when you mess up and send blatantly wrong information to your universities of application – yours truly is living proof). After putting out a few 'fleeces' for God, I took the step of faith and applied to the University of Cambridge to read BA Education with Physical Sciences, a course very close to my heart.

The entire application process was a journey of God's grace right to the end. After receiving the conditional offer from Cambridge, I fulfilled the

conditions of the required subjects (2 A\* 1 A in Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics) by just one extra mark. I believe it is God's way of telling me: 'not by your own strength, but simply because My grace is sufficient for you'.

Your journey may be different. God is very creative and will usually 'custom-make' His plans for each of His children, but at the end of the day it is not a 'Journey to Cambridge' (for my case), or journey to wherever else: it is a 'Journey with God'. Have fun on your journey!

#### I went there before work because I had a headache, and I felt very refreshed after that. Anyway, there are many opportunities for spiritual growth here in Messiah, and some of it is mandatory for students, such as chapel. Chapel is held twice a week on Tuesdays and Thursdays and we'll need to attend 24 of those every semester. You can also attend different talks and forums which also count as credit, but you will need to attend a minimum number of chapels that usually have speakers to talk about a certain subject to strengthen our faith. There are many Bible Study groups here too, and I've joined one led by one of the apartments.

Every Sunday, 12-15 different buses from different churches come to Messiah College in the morning, and students have the choice to go to any one of these churches. The denominations vary, and students may choose every Sunday. I tried a couple of churches before actually attending one regularly—a Brethren-in-Christ church. I feel that the sermons are solid, but I have yet to find time to serve there, partly because it's hard for me to get to the church unless they provide transport because I don't drive.

Also, there are many opportunities



to serve in many different ministries on campus, but one very notable one is the Agape Centre. The Agape Centre is a hub for students to find a place to volunteer outside of campus. My work with the Alzheimer's patients for the Psychology course is through the Agape Centre, and that is only one of the many outreach programs that Messiah College offers. There are many different opportunities and Messiah logs about 60,000 hours of service every year.

I found a mentor here in Messiah College, and we have met a number of times over lunch to discuss different things—church traditions, my questions on reformed theology, struggles that people face, and more. I have been very blessed to be guided by him.

Looking back, I am thankful for the grace of God that really brought me through the financial, academic, and spiritual aspects of my life here in the United States.

#### Study Life

Messiah College is located in a suburban area, and you'll need a car to get to the nearest town which is about a 10-minute drive away. We have no public transport. This leaves us in a campus that has very few distractions, and studying becomes much easier as well.

God used this opportunity to bring me out of my comfort zone to try some new courses, such as Philosophy. It was a very interesting course, and though I only got a B+ for it in my A Levels, I felt that I have benefited greatly in terms of understanding my faith and how man perceives a relationship with God. I

learned about many philosophical arguments during the course, through many philosophers who asked questions like "What is truth?", "Why doesn't God intervene with evil?" and many others.

philosophers who were/are strong theologians as well. Sort of a balancing act!

My other courses have been very interesting, and one was particularly memorable. It was about "telling our stories", so we read memoirs and learnt to write. I didn't know how lousy my writing was until I sat through that class. It was filled with Honour students and all of them wrote exceptionally well. Phoebe and Joel were in that class too, and we all agreed that the class was our favourite class of the semester because the professors made us really interested in learning how to write.

Besides that, I could really feel the presence of the Holy Spirit in that class as we "learned to tell our stories" – death of loved ones, family crises, personal struggles – we wrote them out as reflections and shared them in front of class. In it, I talked about that class, and how it has really changed my life.

I took a communications course as well: "Fundamentals of Oral Communication", and learned much about presenting, communicating, and reading to other people. I also took a Psych course on Life Span

Development, and that
course was really

and also work with

#### Spiritual Life

It has been a blessing to be in a Christian college. Messiah College is non-denominational, but holds on to three traditions: Pietism, Anabaptist, and Wesleyan. I have yet to learn more about these traditions in a course that I am taking next semester. There is a good mix of denominations here in this college, and the campus is really a haven for quiet time.

Having moved from Penang to pursue the diploma, I had to learn to be independent and take care of myself. I think being independent while still being close enough to home was really good for me to grow while still having something to fall back to.

The course itself has also given me opportunities to be independent and to find my own way, with guidance of course. I think my time management skills have improved dramatically after my time in MCKL, thanks to the assignments. In high school, assignments can be done the day before without much consequence. In college, it's a whole new ball game. Assignments have to be meticulously planned! That training helped me a lot because now I'm on top of my



assignments and don't really have to panic.

My time in the ECE programme has allowed me to mature both intellectually and emotionally, all in a warm and nurturing environment. Being allowed to learn in this kind of environment, in my opinion, is something quite rare in this day and age. The relationships with the lecturers and the staff don't stop at the professional level, they also go to the

personal level, which I have experienced and appreciated myself.

The program itself, I believe, has prepared me for coming here (University of Gloucestershire) to study because it laid down the foundation of Early Childhood Education. While there might be a cultural difference, most of the beliefs and theories are the same. I initially thought that I would have to start from scratch when I came here to study, but as long as you've got the bedrock of Early Childhood Education secured, you're pretty much good to know to any university you want to complete your degree.

#### My MCKL Experience

I immensely enjoyed my time in MCKL! I made a lot of fantastic people here, some of whom have become my best friends. I especially love the environment, not only the learning environment, but the physical

#### A Word of Advice...

Do a lot of reading! While some modules may be hands on, certain modules, especially the psychology based ones, require a lot of reading. Having background knowledge on the subject you are studying is essential. Even the subjects that are based on active learning. Knowing what to expect and being able to apply the theory behind it will give you an upper hand in the classroom. Many a time I can't figure out where I am in the lesson because I didn't bother to read up before hand on what it is about.

I know, you may think that why read when you're going to be listening to it in the lecture anyway? Well, sometimes reading can help you understand what the lecturer is saying, making your time in class a more productive one.

Plan everything ahead! We college students make the mistake of thinking we're super students with super powers. As much as we like to think that, we are not. We can't get

an assignment done in a day or study the entire textbook the night before the exam and not suffer for it. Planning your academic year or making what I like to call a "game plan" will keep you on top of things. No more hysterically

writing assignments or frantically reading notes before and exam for you! For example, you can give yourself a dateline to mature both intellectually start and assignment, or a specific date you want to and emotionally, all in a start studying a subject.

> Set realistic goals for yourself! When I first started college, I told myself, "Do your best!" or "You must do well in this test!" I found that to be slightly misleading, because without a tangible goal, finding a direction to that goal would be really hard. Instead of telling myself to do well or my best, I told myself that I want to achieve a certain grade and work towards that! I'm a believer in positive reinforcement and I always reward myself for reaching

Some of my goals during my time in MCKL were:

- 1. Pass every subject so I can graduate
- Get a GPA of 3.7 and above for all the subjects
- 3. Finish all my assignments 2 days before they are to be submitted
- 4. Go out to lunch with my friends at least once a week (Yes, it was an actual goal!)

Go to the University Placement Office! They are very knowledgeable and will be able to help you out with the application process. Also, don't leave your application till the last minute! Make sure you plan when to apply and have a timeline. Don't make the same mistake as I did and push everything to the last minute. I got my visa a mere few days before I left for the UK!

#### **Future Plans**

I would like to work with children with special needs. I find that there is a need for special needs education teachers in Malaysia. Currently, there are very few special education schools and the ones that are there have a mixture of all kinds of disabilities, which I feel can render the environment unconducive for learning. I also hope to be able to incorporate dance and music into teaching, as I have been trained in these areas and find it helpful to keep the lessons interesting and get across, especially, to those whose learning styles are kinesthetic.

Also, I find that the Malaysian education system doesn't promote creative learning. It is mostly about role learning and memorizing. While this may be easy for some, most children are just not built that way. There are so many children whose learning styles are not being catered to, and I am sure of that because I was one of them.

As I mentioned above, I would like to incorporate dance and music into my lessons. I believe that this would make my lessons more interesting, capturing the attention of the children. Once the attention is captured, it is all downhill from there. In fact, I am planning to write my dissertation on the effectiveness of dance in the classroom as a teaching tool. I hope to be able to bring that back to Malaysia and make a difference, however small, on the education in Malaysia.

## Fung Jia Jun, A Level Class of 2013



After completing his studies in MCKL, former STAR scholar Fung Jia Jun, more commonly known as John Fung, enrolled in Monash University Malaysia to study Medical Bioscience, which is a field of study focusing on the theoretical aspects of medicine and biology, specialising in research as opposed to the practical training that doctors receive.

He was offered two full scholarships under the Star Education Fund - one to do BSc (Hons) Biomedical Sciences in University of Nottingham, Semenyih, Malaysia and another to do Bachelor of Pharmacy (Hons) in Taylor's University, Malaysia. However, he eventually chose the Jeffrey Cheah Foundation Scholarship, which covered all of his fees, provided for accommodation and even gave him a monthly stipend as well, which greatly reduced his financial dependency on his single mother for his university years.

One might expect his success to be attributed to hard work and excellent academic results, but John believes that there is much more to it than that. MCKL did more than just facilitate his studies; it also helped him to grow as a person.

He says, "Studying is important, no doubt about it. However, don't let studies hold you back from exploring and experiencing the world. There is so much more out there that you will learn and be able to apply in life than what you can learn from books.

"I was actively involved as the secretary in MCKL's Stratagem Club and Rotaract Club. Both clubs provided numerous experiences for me to further

build myself up as a leader. This was because at many times, I would have to step up and help with the running of the clubs, prepare important letters and also meet with the college administrators in order to keep the club running.

"Besides being involved in clubs, I was also the Head of Finance for the College's Vision Editorial Board 2013. The main function of my department was to source for the funds needed to print the college magazine. It wasn't easy leading and constantly pushing all my team members, but we managed to garner a total of RM13,000.00 sponsorship for the magazine which was far above our initial target of RM5,000.00. I believe that this has taught me that in order to achieve certain goals during my university life, consistency and diligence is greatly needed. It has also taught me that working as a team can help to increase the likelihood of success which is much needed in group assignments during my university life.

"Overall, MCKL has helped by preparing me with the knowledge needed for my course as well as given me the opportunity to learn how to mix with students from other countries. Right now, in Monash, there are a lot of international students here and it is important to know how to communicate and mix well with them, as well as to learn from them about their culture."

As proof of the lasting impact of his experience, John has not stopped participating in co-curricular activities simply because he no longer needs it for university applications. Even during his current studies in

Monash University, he took part in the Asia Pacific Regional Rotaract Conference (APRRC) 2013 in Taiwan from 7 - 10 September 2013. This international event follows the philosophy of New Generations Service promoted by Rotary International, which aims to develop leadership, teamwork, and personality of young global leaders, and John relates his experience as follows:

"I was exposed to the various cultures in Taiwan and also to mix around with people from the many countries that participated. The talks and events organised throughout the conference allowed me to work together with people of different culture, race and background. It is indeed beneficial for a person like me who loves to network and get to know more people. Through this conference, I have now more friends all over the world who would gladly host me if i were to ever visit their country and they will be more than willing to bring me to experience their country.

"In this globalised era, it is important to network, but not just at random. It should be with people who will be able to provide you support, experience and empower you to reach out of your comfort zone."



Once he completes his 3-year degree in Medical Bioscience, John intends to continue with an Honours degree and work for a while before finally pursuing a PhD.

# Options & Opportunities at Methodist College Kuala Lumpur

KUALA LUMPUR, May 22 — Looking at Ali Mustafa Hamid today, you would never have guessed that he spent his early years in war-torn Iraq. Wearing a confident smile, this 20-year-old looks like any other student at Methodist College Kuala Lumpur (MCKL), where he scored 3A\*s and 1A for his A-Levels.

"Life was hard in Iraq. I was born in 1993 when the US imposed sanctions on my country. Then, there was the 2003 war and my family decided that it was too much so we finally decided to move to Malaysia," said the well-groomed young man.

Ali recently received two scholarships to study Civil and Structural Engineering in City University of Hong Kong based on his outstanding results. The scholarships cover both his tuition fees and living expenses. Being offered those scholarships really helps because money for education is sparse in his family as he has two older siblings who are studying as well.

Ali did his O-Levels at the International Islamic School but he has no qualms about studying at a Christian college.

"It's not about the college's religious background as long as it teaches discipline and the right values. At MCKL, I learned how to respect other religions. Back in my international school, I was only mixing with other international students and I wanted a Malaysian experience because it was a new culture to me. I'm glad I chose MCKL because now I have many 'heng tais' (brothers in Cantonese)" said Ali.

He also works part-time as part of his "personal development." The generous-hearted young man volunteers for EPIC Homes, an NGO that builds homes for the Orang Asli.

"When you are in need, you want to help those in need as well," said

His college mate, How Han Ming, decided to study at MCKL because it offered him both science and arts subjects for his A-Levels. The recipient of the merit scholarship wanted to do English Literature and Economics alongside Biology and Mathematics, and the college

"Other private colleges in Malaysia do not offer that option and after

finding out about MCKL at an education fair, I checked out the campus and decided that I wanted to study here," said the affable student.

The articulate 19-year-old received offers from eight colleges in the States due to his excellent results in A-Levels, among other deciding factors.

"I decided on Wesleyan University because I want to do Film Studies and Economics. A few alumni from Wesleyan University have gone on to Hollywood," said the eloquent How. He got accepted into the Wesleyan Freeman Asian Scholars Programme which provides scholarships for Asian students, one each from 11 countries in the region.

The Malaysian-American Commission On Educational Exchange (MACEE) covered the costs of his application and flight to the States. It is a grant for Malaysian students interested to study in the States. How found his passion in storytelling and creative abilities at a tender age of 15 when he went for the International Life Sciences Symposium in Singapore. "We (the students) were required to present scientific research based on structured themes. I wasn't passionate about research and being stuck in a lab so I created a storyboard and presented my ideas in fiction form," said How.

He started writing freelance for a local newspaper and he wrote a few articles for NGOs like Malaysian Nature Society and Amnesty International.

At 17, he wrote scripts for The Platform, an openmic night organised by KLPac for young talents in performing arts. Last year, the creative How wrote the play "Love is a four-letter word", a play for the Short + Sweet Festival.


Short + Sweet Festival is dubbed 'The Biggest Little Festival in the World' where 10-minute original plays are run in one sitting.

What's it like to be a young playwright? "At first I felt intimidated because a lot of people in the theatre world are working adults. But I get feedback from performing art veterans and I learned how to communicate with the actors." The "accidentally artistic" How believes that there's a bright future for the film industry in Malaysia and hopes to come home armed with the knowledge he gets from Wesleyan University.

"The government is investing in film studios in Malaysia. Also, I think Hollywood is saturated with too many actors and directors," said How. And like Ali, How did not find studying in a Christian college an issue despite coming from a Buddhist

"I like the culture in MCKL. Other colleges would just prioritise studies but here, I'm able to learn beyond the textbook," said How.

#### **UWE Professor Guest Lectures at MCKL**



The College recently invited Professor Rebecca Kingsley from the University of West England, an expert in the field of early education, to be a guest lecturer for the Diploma in Early Childhood Education (ECE) students.

The lecture was held in MCKL's auditorium on 21 May, and was attended by a very enthusiastic throng of ECE students and lecturers, as well as several other staff. The topic in question was on 'Learning Through Play'.

Professor Kingsley began with an introduction on the education system in England, drawing on the similarities and differences between their system and Malaysia's, as well as exploring the significance of cultural influence on a nation's area of focus in education. She also elaborated on the various techniques of early childhood education, ranging from the conventional such as parent-teacher involvement and vigilant observation to the less conventional such as outdoors classrooms and emphasis on learning rather than teaching.

Throughout the lecture, our students were given the opportunity to participate through voicing questions and participating in a little experiment conducted within the auditorium. The response was very enthusiastic and positive, which demonstrated Professor Kingsley's point of the effectiveness of engaging students whilst teaching. After the lecture, the students were given the opportunity to ask her more specific questions.

MCKL began offering the A Level programme in 1983 with the EDEXCEL (then London) and AEB boards, eventually offering only the EDEXCEL board by 1986.
