

2014 has come and is almost gone. Last year we celebrated thirty years of excellence and God's blessings on the College, and this year we have continued to experience His providence and continued goodness as the College has grown in student enrolment, staff recruitment, new programmes and provision of facilities.

We bade farewell to Dr Ang Aik Hooi, Director of Academic Studies and welcomed Mr Kwan Kow Cheun as our new Registrar. Ms Betsy Li became the Director of Academic Studies (External Programmes) while Ms Khor Kheng Leik was appointed Director of Academic Studies (Internal Programmes). Dr Tan Hui Leng relinquished her position as Director of Teaching and Learning but continued to help us in facilitating the Art and Science of Teaching and Learning courses for our new lecturers.

We are also very proud of our alumni who joined our teaching staff — Ms Regina Yoong (last year) teaching English Literature, Mr Jeremy Achariam teaching Physics and Ms Zara Kim Khoo in Early Childhood Studies.

In July this year, we began offering ACCA classes and our Certified Accounting Technician (CAT) students have an on-going pathway to pursue their studies in accountancy. Students can obtain a degree in accountancy with the Oxford Brookes University before they complete the ACCA programme. MCKL will play a part in helping our nation achieve its dream of having 60,000 professionally qualified chartered accountants of skill and

integrity by 2020. Credit goes to Ms Chong Moi Moi for the work done to promote this programme in our College.

In August we launched the American Degree Transfer Program which provides a more affordable pathway to higher education in the USA. To-date, we have 17 partner universities in the States which have agreed to accept credit transfers for our students to complete their degrees. Students with good grades in the SPM can register in the ADTP and enjoy a liberal arts education with an opportunity to deepen and widen their intellectual horizons. Under the leadership of Ms Khor Kheng Leik we expect this program to grow.

New science laboratories have been built to meet the needs of this degree program; a music room and a mini lecture theatre will be ready for use next January. At the beginning of next year we will have possession of the field and all the land and buildings of MGS Primary School 2 right up to the canteen. The two primary girls' schools will merge together and they will occupy the premises of School 1. We are looking forward to building an annex in the area of the old porch and plans are being drawn for the podium of the new 15-storey block.

Our first batch of students sitting for the GCE A Levels under Cambridge International Examinations faced the challenges of a new examination format and passed with flying colours. We had a pass rate of 99.2% and more than 30% of students scored 3As and above while several students won coveted awards from CIE. Samuel Lim Qi En was awarded the highest mark in the world in Mathematics and the highest mark in Malaysia in Divinity. He is reading Mathematics in Imperial College, London, on a JPA Scholarship. Benjamin Yew Choon Sen scored the highest mark in the world in the CIE AS Mathematics. Two students, Ng Chew Hou and Samuel Lim Qi En scored 5A\*s. Congratulations to all our A Level students of 2013-2014 and to the lecturers who guided them through successfully!

We also celebrated with our students who participated in and organized country-wide events such as the Model United Nations meetings, Young Nation Builders meetings, SUKMA sports, charity and community events such as Kids' Carnivals where more than four hundred Myanmar children were feted and given the opportunity to enjoy a day of good food and healthy games.

In February the Student Council organized a Neon Run which was non-competitive and raised RM14,000/- for Stop Hunger Now. For the second year in a row, our students emerged runners-up in the Standard Chartered Kuala Lumpur Marathon.

These student-run activities promote a holistic education in which our students develop into leaders who manage their time properly and are accepted into good universities locally and abroad. Many of them have won prestigious scholarships and in the following pages you will be reading stories of how a second chance helped them overcome various challenges and roadblocks - financial, physical, emotional - and have excelled, including Arthur Mun Siew Meng who had to overcome many hurdles before securing a Gamuda Scholarship to read Civil Engineering at Imperial College London.

We are especially thrilled when Alumni write to us to let us know of their achievements in university. Their good success is due to the strong support of parents and families, and the dedication of College lecturers and support staff. Together with their own drive to achieve their dreams, we shall have MCKLites who will go forth and change the world.

We are delighted when they come back to share their experiences through talks and dialogues with our current students. Their testimonies are recorded in the following pages to serve as an inspiration to their juniors. Michael Lim Xian-Wei and Chan Yen Ping were recently back from the UK and they served as interns with the respective Ministers of Sports and Education for seven weeks of their summer holidays. MCKL is blessed with a wide network of alumni and we hope to accomplish more through the MCKL Alumni Association in the future.

We thank God for His manifold blessings upon MCKL and aspire to stay true to our mission of grooming talented young nation builders of integrity who will strive for excellence in life!

## MCKL Through the Decades:

## Celebrating Over 30 Years of God's Goodness, Grace and Glory



On the evening of 13th July 2013, Methodist College Kuala Lumpur celebrated its 30th Anniversary at the Hilton Kuala Lumpur Hotel, marking the progress of the College through thick and thin. It gave many students and staff the opportunity to reunite, some after many years, and was the perfect platform to launch the MCKL Alumni Association.

It all began thirty years ago, when the College was simply a school intended to serve as an institution of second chances for students who were unsuccessful in passing their public school examinations. When they otherwise would have faced a bleak future, the then Methodist High School enabled them to complete their secondary education.

Throughout the years, various Methodist patrons have played a pivotal role in ensuring the College's survival and growth in an ever-changing education landscape. In 1983, Methodist High School changed its name to Methodist College Kuala Lumpur, and Datuk Bhupalan became its founding Principal. She undertook the task of securing approval for the GCE A Level certificate to go alongside the Malaysian STPM. Under her dynamic leadership, the student population grew tremendously for the next ten years, to the point where the classes for Form 1 had to be shifted the new branch campus in Sentul, Kuala Lumpur.

In 1994, after having firmly established Methodist College Kuala Lumpur and its Sentul campus, Datuk F. R. Bhupalan retired and handed the reins over to Mr A. R. Peter, who led the College through a new phase as an

institution for post-secondary education. He continued the migration of secondary school students to the Sentul campus, and by 1999, only pre-university students remained in the Brickfields campus. The College grew relatively quiet as a result of this.

Soon after that in August 2003, Mr A. R. Peter passed the torch to Datuk Dr Chiam Heng Keng, who began developing the ethos of MCKL into one of a tertiary institution.

Staff and students were introduced to practices that were typical of colleges, such as removing the need for uniforms and introducing flexible timetables for students. At the same time, she ensured that ethics, integrity and discipline were not compromised in the effort to give MCKL a more college-like atmosphere, and continued to keep it well-grounded in Christian values. She also introduced the Certificate in English programme and the Diploma in Early Childhood Education. However, these developments did little to reverse the decline of student numbers in the College.

MCKL persevered regardless, and in March 2006, Ms Moey Yoke Lai, former Principal of Methodist Boys' School, took over as CEO of the College. She worked tirelessly to bring in more students for the courses offered. Plans were drawn up for expansion of the College, which would include an auditorium, many new classrooms and several new facilities in order to attract more students.

Although the project seemed beyond the means of MCKL at the time, Ms Moey and the Methodist Council of Education soldiered on, trusting in the Lord to provide the resources necessary to see the project through to the end. Construction began at the end of 2008, and by the time it was completed, more



Their participation in the various activities will help them develop interest in different cultures, build confidence, time management, leadership and interpersonal skills, and mature in self-control and discipline.

MCKL's Christian Fellowship is one of the most comprehensive in these aspects, as it also allows students to grow in their faith and relationship with God in addition to having fellowship with others from all walks of life, regardless of race or creed. For example, the Interfaith Dialogue which is organised annually by the Christian Fellowship is an excellent platform for students to grow in mutual understanding and interracial harmony.


## Renovations and Upgrades to Facilities

CAT students have the advantage of having covered the ACCA Knowledge modules during their course, making it one of the quickest pathways to becoming a Certified Chartered Accountant, with only 3 years of study and 3 years working experience upon completing SPM or O Level examinations.

Methodist College Kuala Lumpur (MCKL) has an extensive track record in sending students to prestigious universities overseas - to the UK, Australia, Singapore, Hong Kong and also the United States. In recent years, Methodist College Kuala Lumpur has seen a marked increase in students pursuing tertiary education in the United States. Recent MCKL alumni who have moved on to the US include Chew Kwang Liang in Yale University, Lim Kai Shin and Timothy Ong in Kent State University, Bryan Leong in Messiah College and Serena Chua in Colby-Sawyer College.

According to Ms Moey Yoke Lai, the CEO of MCKL, many parents expressed their desire to send their children to the US for higher education, and so the College American Degree Transfer Program (ADTP) to give students a smooth, affordable and efficient pathway to US universities.

MCKL officially launched the ADTP on the 2nd of October. In attendance were the Guest of Honour, Reverend Dr Ong Hwai Teik, Bishop of the Methodist Church in Malaysia and YB Dato' Dr Tan Kee Kwong, Chairman of the Board of Management of MCKL. At the Launch, MCKL CEO Ms Moey and Dr Kim S. Phipps, President of Messiah College, US signed a memorandum of understanding, offering MCKL students an exclusive scholarship to study at Messiah College.

Setting up the programme was no small feat. It was developed over the course of two years by Ms Khor Kheng Leik, who has over 10 years' experience heading American courses in Malaysia. Former US university placement specialist Ms Veronica Yap and former Director of Academic Studies Dr Ang Aik Hooi were also instrumental in developing the syllabus and forming relationships with American Universities, helped in no small part by alumni like Lim Kai Shin and Bryan Leong, who at that time were performing admirably in their American

To date, 17 American universities have partnered with MCKL in this programme, with more partnerships in the pipelines. There will be plenty of opportunities for research, internship and practical training, as well as scholarships and financial aid for students in need.

In conjunction with the ADTP Launch, President Phipps conducted a seminar highlighting the unique features of higher education in the US and the education opportunities available there. The seminar was well-received and attended by many

secondary school principals and counsellors from around Kuala Lumpur and Selangor.

In the months prior to the official launch of the ADTP@MCKL, the College organised an Info Day on the 5th of June this year so that students and parents could become familiar with the ins and outs of this pathway to American Universities.

The session covered matters such as study plans, entry requirements, credit transfers, partner universities, academic expenses and the benefits of studying in American Universities, just to name a few.

As a bonus, several of MCKL's alumni who had gone on to pursue studies in the US, including Timothy Ong and Lim Kai Shin from Kent State University, attended the Info Day so that students and parents could get information directly from those who had seen what lies ahead on this path.

According to Ms Khor, "ADTP is the most flexible program that offers a wide range of studies across different disciplines, and the availability of Optional Practical Training (OPT) in the education system provides opportunities for graduates to gain industrial experience in the US and widen their network in their respective fields."

The enrolment of the inaugural cohort of ADTP@MCKL students on the 15th of August this year is a milestone signifying MCKL's entry into a new phase of providing quality tertiary education for young Malaysians, and we wish them all the very best in their academic endeavours!



Ikhwan chose AUSMAT because he preferred consistent work as opposed to last-minute cramming, and through hard work, he became the top student of AUSMAT Class of 2013 with an

ATAR score of 99.10. He won prizes for his excellent academic performance in the examinations: a Certificate of Distinction by the Western Australian School Curriculum and Standards Authority for scoring in the top 0.5 percent of the examinations in Human Biological Science, was a top scorer in Physics and Chemistry as well, and was given the Tan Sri FR Bhupalan award for his outstanding achievements in MCKL.

"We learned a lot in our practicums, and it was great to discover new ways of teaching instead of sticking to old routines. In other words, we were learning to become better teachers for the children."

In addition, Lee Cheng believes that although parents often look for the best kindergartens and education programmes for their children, the system is only as good as the people who run and maintain them. Therefore, the teachers have to be welltrained in addition to possessing a passion for nurturing and educating children.

"Not everyone needs an engineer, but everyone needs a teacher. I believe that we as teachers are crucial to the development of children and a



country's future. As such, we have the responsibility of making sure that we are properly prepared to give our best to the children, and here at MCKL, I found that preparation.

"The ECE course is tough, but the lecturers don't leave anyone behind. There is a spiritual quality here that mixes well with academic substance and quality that I really found supportive and inspiring."

Now that she has graduated from the programme, Lee Cheng plans to continue teaching with her newly improved knowledge and skills, and will continue looking for opportunities for further

The Khazanah Global Scholarship is very prestigious and sought-after by Malaysian students in their pursuit of undergraduate and postgraduate studies in leading universities around the world. Thousands of Malaysia's top students apply each year, and only a handful of perhaps nine or ten will eventually be awarded the scholarship.

And last year, two of Methodist College Kuala Lumpur's (MCKL) students managed to do just that. Lok Chen-Yue and Ng Wai Lam managed to secure Khazanah Scholarships for their studies in University College London, UK and University of Oxford, UK, respec-

According to their experience, students who wish to apply for the Khazanah Scholarship must be able to show their potential to be a vanguard in their field of interest and prove their relevant competence and knowledge, which should also include a variety of social skills. Excellent academic results are also essential, but that only gets applicants through the first gate. Applicants will still have to go through four stages of interviews conducted by the Directors of Khazanah themselves, and only 9 out of the 4000 applicants in that year eventually acquired the scholarship. In light of that, Ng Wai Lam and Lok Chen Yue have proven themselves as followers MCKL's vision: Excellence for Life.

Ng Wai Lam enrolled for the A Level programme in 2011 to study Biology, Chemistry, Physics and Mathematics. Although one might see his choice as exemplary of the typical science student, his views on the matter are anything but. He notes that the Arts are often stigmatised in Malaysia and seen as somehow inferior to the Sciences, and is of the opinion that such an attitude is not helpful in the education of Malaysia's youth. Those whose talents lie in the Arts would be unnecessarily branded as inferior students, and might sometimes be forced into the Sciences and subsequently careers that they take no joy in, and therefore feel no passion or purpose in their working lives.

He did not get to thoroughly explore



the Arts in school due to this public perception, and laments the lost opportunity since he had always liked the English language and was rather interested in taking up English Literature. However, he ended up nurturing an interest in Biochemistry because that was what he was good at in school. To hear him say it, it was basically a case of taking the path of least resistance, developing an interest in it, and then deciding that it was what he wanted to do as a career.

And MCKL played a part in helping him discover that passion. The College provided the foundation on which he built his passion by providing a conducive, competitive environment that encouraged him to push himself to participate in co-curricular activities in addition to his studies. He had the opportunity to attend a Bio-informatics Workshop at Perdana University and got to meet influential experts in the field.

He is now studying Biochemistry in the University of Oxford, UK, and he hopes to pioneer stem cell research in Malaysia and change the social view of the field into seeing it as a worthwhile investment of the country's resources. That passion is evident in his academic history, and played a vital role in excelling in his studies and securing the Khazanah scholarship.

Lok Chen-Yue, on the other hand, says that MCKL's environment played an important role in helping him to find his true calling in the Arts. Although MCKL's relatively strict rules regarding student behaviour took a little getting used to, he believes that it ultimately helped him to focus and hone his skills. Moreover, the low lecturer to student ratio meant that more attention could be given to students to nurture their strengths to compensate for their weaknesses. In his case, his budding interest in economics was well



nurtured and eventually culminated in an epiphany that it was the career that he would pursue in life.

Chen-Yue is now studying Economics in University College London, UK and plans to get into economic politics research, preferably in a party that is independent from political influence. His worry is that Malaysia has no independent voices guiding its economic policies, and that this is not very beneficial to the country's long-term interests.

As of today, Wai Lam and

Chen-Yue are studying in their respective universities under the Khazanah Scholarship. MCKL is proud of their accomplishments, and we hope that many more students will follow in their footsteps.

## Making it through Bar school

After slogging away for 3 years doing the LL.B, it's time to make a choice, either to carry on with a Masters or to do a professional course.

In the UK, there are 2 specific professional courses that a student can take. One, the Bar Professional Training Course (BPTC) or two, the Legal Practice Course (LPC).

Unfortunately, Malaysian students intending to come home and practise, can only choose to do the BPTC.

Application for the BPTC opens in November with a deadline sometime in January. Just a heads up, the application process involves 7 to 8 essays to be written. However, do not let this deter you from applying for the course. I must say that the BPTC has been one of the best parts of my legal education. Everything you thought the law was going to be, the BPTC offers.

Having said that though, it is not all Boston legal and no work; be prepared for long hours drafting opinions and awkward practices in front of the mirror for submission advocacy.

To help all you budding lawyers start your legal career, I have devised a short list of things to consider when applying for the BPTC.

#### 1. FIND OUT ABOUT THE INNS OF COURT EARLY

There are 4 Inns of Court, namely Inner Temple, Middle Temple, Gray's and Lincoln's. You can only apply to one. They are different but are all equal to each other.

You are allowed to be a student member of an Inn of Court even before enrolling for the BPTC. The benefit of doing so is that you'll be able to get some of your qualifying sessions done before starting the BPTC.

### 2. INNS SCHOLarship

Knowing about your preferred Inn early will give you the added advantage of allowing you to apply for an Inns Scholarship. This Scholarship ranges on amount depending on the Inn of your choice.

The Inns Scholarship aims at aiding students with their BPTC fees and recipients of the scholarships are usually students who are very keen at remaining in the UK to practise.

The interview is quite intense and can be quite unnerving, but your personal tutors will always be more than happy to help you prepare for the interview.

### 3. YOU' LAW SCHOOL OF CHOICE

It is always good to find out about which law school you intend to do our BPTC at early.

Some law schools like City Law School allows prospective students to apply for their scholarships usually aimed at international students who are the first in their family to be a barrister.

Cardiff Law School on the other hand, makes it easy for students to either shadow a barrister or marshal a judge with their placement-week programmes.

Whichever you choose, All the BPTC providers are accredited by the Bar Standards Board, so it does not matter where you decide to do your BPTC, all your learning outcomes will be the same.

When choosing your BPTC provider, it is always a good idea to find out what elective subjects they offer and whether that law school has the subjects you want to take.

### 4. Bar standards Board

If you have any questions, email the Bar Standards Board (BSB). The BSB is very prompt with their replies, especially during application season.

Once everything is done, all you have to do now is enjoy an amazing 9 months of public speaking. Hah! Happy studying!



# Building A Case for MCKL

First Time Mooters Emerge As Competition Runner's Up



When Heng Jean Anne, Desmond Yap Xue Zing and David Tan Wei Ern signed up for the Bond University High School Mooting Competition Kuala Lumpur 2014 on 28 June, they were only hoping to gain exposure and enhance their skills in the courtroom. What the three MCKL A Level Law students didn't expect was to emerge the runners-up amongst the seven competing teams.

The elated trio of first-time mooters made up the only team representing MCKL in the competition, up against those from Taylors College Subang Jaya, Taylors College Sri Hartamas, and two teams each from INTI College and Wesley Methodist School Sentul. Success was all the sweeter since this was the first time a team from MCKL was participating in the competition.

This competition aims to introduce students to a courtroom environment-particularly for those interested in furthering their education in law, as well as to promote Bond University as a tertiary education institution option for international students who take part in the competition.

"A moot is a quite simply defined as a legal argument conducted by opposing teams before one or more judges," explains Jean. "The argument involves the application of legal rules to factual situations mirroring those dealt with by the courts every day.

"The winning team is decided by assessing the advocacy skills of the participants, rather than on the merits of the case. It is therefore possible for a team to lose the case, but win the moot."

"A moot team consists of a senior counsel (Desmond) and a junior counsel (David), both of whom were to present the arguments before the judge on the day of the moot itself, as well as an instructing solicitor (yours truly) who was tasked to research relevant material and prepare the speeches containing the law-based arguments.

"All these had to be done in the period

of time between our receiving the facts of the case law and the day of the moot, which was a mere six days apart. We spent every single one of the six days tossing around ideas, arguments and pieces of paper with bits of relevant information scribbled upon, trying to formulate a water-proof argument that would not only ensure the solidity of our stance as appellant, but also one that would also show forth our advocacy skills and articulating abilities which were, ultimately, the main elements we would be judged upon."

From the seven teams which participated this year, only two would move on to the final round. As the underdog team, Jean, David and Desmond were looking forward to the finals as spectators, not participants.

"After a lunch break, the two teams that made it to the finals were announced. To our complete surprise, (and slight horror), the team from Methodist College Kuala Lumpur had surpassed the performances of the other teams and was now contending with the team from Taylors College Subang Jaya for the first place, which included a 40% law scholarship at Bond University for each team member, a RM1000 cash prize and trophies as prizes. Both teams were given only half an hour to prepare and calm their frazzled nerves before presenting their final arguments before the judge and audience."

"In the end, we were awarded the runner-up place with Taylors College Subang Jaya taking home the gold. The prizes included certificates of participation, cash prizes as well as trophies.

The mooting team of three attributes much of its success to the

assistance of alumni Loi Kin-Hoe, currently reading law at Queen's University Belfast, Ireland.

Kin-Hoe's role as advisor-trainer was instrumental in preparing them with practical information and assisting them in developing strategies for the competition. Their Law lecturer, Mr Michael Moey, was also very supportive of the team and encouraged their participation in the competition.

"All in all, it was a modest accomplishment made sweeter by the novelty of our participation," beams Jean, "and if anything, it is a shared hope that though this may be the first time Methodist College Kuala Lumpur has ventured forth into unknown waters, it will not be the last."

The team's success at the mooting competition serves as an inspiration to others who wish to take part in future competitions and has re-sparked interest in setting up a College mooting club. The future of mooting at MCKL looks bright indeed.

Bemoaning the state of education in Malaysia today is a very common activity in social gatherings today. Whilst it is true, many of us probably do not realise how grave the situation is for the children of Malaysia. Specifically, for all the children of Malaysia — not just the ones we see in the city and suburbs.

Finding a good school for our children is a major concern for practically every parent these days, but the truth is that we often do not realise how blessed we are in comparison to some of our neighbours.

For some, the quality of the school and education system does not even enter into consideration simply because they do not have the resources to get past the most basic barriers to a decent education — cost, transport and language proficiency.

This is a particularly pressing issue for the Orang Asli communities in Malaysia, as they are already facing battles on several fronts such as cultural erosion, loss of land and indifference from their fellow Malaysians. The lack of access to good education is likely to harm them a lot more in the long run than most Malaysian communities.

The Methodist Council of Education recognises this need, which is why in 2013, Nor Arima, Zulfahadila and Norizaiful from the Sengoi community in Kampung Lanchang Rancangan Pembangunan Semula Pos Betau, Pahang were sent to Methodist College Kuala Lumpur (MCKL), fully sponsored, to receive higher education.

However, before they could

begin their Diploma in Early Childhood Education (ECE) programme, they first had to contend with the language barrier that is so often faced by the Orang Asli. To assist them, MCKL's English faculty designed an English Language course specifically for their needs, to help bridge the gap between their proficiency in the language with the requirements of tertiary education.

Zulfahadila admitted that the prospect of studying in the city so far from home was daunting at first, partly because they could not communicate well with their fellow Malaysians and partly because the Orang Asli village was very close to their hearts.

"We were scared at first. [Orang Asli] usually don't like to leave their village," she said. But after five months or so of hard work in intensive English Classes, they had acquired the necessary proficiency in order to communicate effectively and were finally ready for the ECE

All three of them have enrolled in the 2014 January intake for ECE, and are working hard to prepare themselves for a career in teaching the future generations of Malaysia.

Norizaiful expressed interest in gaining experience from working in the city, but nevertheless remembers that their time spent in MCKL is more importantly a part of their mission to help the Orang Asli community take a more active role in shaping Malaysia's future, a role that has been out of their reach for far too long. As Nor Arima puts it, "We want to go back and teach the children in our village when we finish."

Aside from their academic growth, it has also been a wonder to witness these students growing as persons. All three of them expressed a joy in learning and were happy to have the opportunity to befriend fellow Malaysians of different ethnicities from different communities.

"It was an interesting journey, and now that we have new friends, it is not so bad," says Zulfahadila.

Indeed, it is most heartening to see that they are following in the footsteps of Ranimah Oransum, one of their seniors from the Dusun community in Sabah who recently completed the ECE programme. She too was driven by a desire to help her community, and it is our hope that many more students will choose a similar path of Christ-like service through life.

However, we should also remember that these are just the first few steps in the long journey of helping our neighbours. Miss Khor Kheng Leik, the Deputy

Miss Khor Kheng Leik, the Deputy Director of Academic Studies, considers it "a privilege to witness their lives being transformed", but also stressed that more needs to be done.

In the future, MCKL and its affiliates would like to be able to send people to Orang Asli villages to train new teachers so that their communities can become self-sufficient when it comes to early childhood education, which would in turn alleviate some of the difficulties that they face when it comes to sending their children for higher education.

Miss Moey Yoke Lai, the CEO of MCKL, views this endeavour as a privilege and duty of the College and puts it thus, "We realise afresh the mandate given to the College by the Methodist Church of Malaysia — to provide quality education for the youth of our nation."

Due to personal reasons, Norizaiful is taking a break from studies. Meanwhile, Nor Arima and Zulfahadila are adjusting well and will be completing the first year of the Diploma programme this December. They are looking forward to the long holidays, which they will spend back home in Pahang.




